WORKING PAPERS

From Subjectivity to Intersubjectivity: Reviving Elo Rankings for Measuring Subjective Social Concepts. *Co-author:* Dr. Seon Yup Lee

This paper presents a case for integrating the Elo ranking system – traditionally used for things like chess rankings – into social science survey methods to improve the measurement of subjective social concepts. By adapting Elo rankings for survey-based research, we suggest that this approach addresses the limitations of traditional methods like Likert scales, enabling more reliable, intersubjective rankings for complex social constructs such as job difficulty or perceived risk.

Status: presented at the American Association for Public Opinion Research (AAPOR) conference 2025.

The Sociology of Supererogation - How Heroic Acts Indicate the Presence of Broader Systemic Problems. *Co-author*: Dr. Seon Yup Lee

This study introduces a sociological framework for examining supererogation—or heroic acts—as a lens to uncover problematic systemic gaps in social structures. By analyzing acts that go beyond the duty of individuals, we highlight how these moments reveal flaws within institutions and explore mechanisms to reduce dependency on such acts, promoting a more resilient social order.

Status: Data collection complete. Anticipated submission in January/2025.

Stop, Wait a Minute: The Effect of Mandatory Breaks in Surveys of Online Panel Respondents. *Co-author*: Dr. Seon Yup Lee

The study explores the impact of mandatory short pauses in online surveys on response quality. With growing reliance on crowdsourcing platforms like Prolific for social research, concerns persist regarding data quality due to cognitive burdens such as lengthy or complex surveys. This research tests the efficacy of a 30-second mandatory pause featuring natural imagery, hypothesizing that it may alleviate cognitive load, potentially improve honesty, attention, and response reliability, or have no significant effect. Using a two-group experimental design, 2,256 respondents were surveyed about environmental policies, comparing results between pause and non-pause condition. The study evaluates whether the added cost of the intervention enhances data quality across measures such as internal reliability, self-reported honesty, and attention check accuracy. *Status*: Data collection is complete. The manuscript is being prepared for submission to a journal.

Creating Belonging in Retail Spaces: How Non-White Names Impact Customer Loyalty.

This study explores how personalized service practices – such as calling customers by their given name – influence the sense of belonging for individuals with non-white or foreign-sounding names. By investigating the effects of name recognition on customer interactions, this research highlights how businesses may unintentionally alienate certain customers and impact their loyalty. The study emphasizes the importance of cultural sensitivity and inclusivity, proposing that a sense of belonging, fostered by acknowledging one's name, is essential to creating positive customer experiences and building brand loyalty. *Status*: Manuscript drafting phase, preparing for data collection.

- Gathered information on group quarters, preparing enumerators for the census count. I also canvassed and located difficult-to-reach populations using community resources.
